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# New Courthouse




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This is an exciting time for the Court as construction continues to progress well on the new Superior Court building in Kingman. The contractor, Johnson Carlier, broke ground in April and to date they continue to meet their milestones to have the project completed within 20 months. The initial ground work has been completed, footings have been poured, all elevator and stairwell shafts are complete and currently they are in the final stages of getting all steel work erected. The contractor anticipates having all decking for the 2nd, 3rd and 4th floors completed by the end of September and will begin pouring the concrete for the floors after that. In November they will begin to erect the walls and interior work will begin soon after.

Named in honor of the former Mohave County Superior Court Judge and Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court, recipients of the award demonstrate a commitment to improving the practice of law and exemplifying exceptional moral character.



GROUND BREAKING FOR NEW  
SUPERIOR COURT

On March 18, 2019 before many distinguished guests including the Arizona Supreme Court Chief Justice, County Supervisors, current and former Superior Court Judges and members of the public, a ground breaking ceremony was held for the new Superior Courthouse. Presiding Judge Charles W. Gurtler, Jr. who has championed this project for the past six years, noted this new facility will increase efficiency, provide enhanced service to the public and allow the courts to meet the growing demand in the coming years.



STRATEGIC AGENDA  
AWARD

For the third year in a row, Chief Justice Scott Bales presented the Juvenile Division of the Mohave County Probation Department with a Strategic Agenda award. This year's award recognized the efforts in Protecting Children, Families and Communities. The award was presented at the Annual Court Leadership Conference on October 24, 2018.



## Greetings:

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The judicial officers and court staff continue to focus on improving programs and enhancing the delivery of justice. New innovations to highlight this year include a new E-Certification program that allows the Clerk's office to send out certified documents electronically to customers of the court. The Clerk's office, in conjunction with court IT staff and an outside vendor, established a new process to provide debit cards to jurors instead of paper checks. This new process streamlines the internal process within the Clerk's office and saves court funds. The Probation department continues to roll-out and expand its Project AIMS, an evening reporting center that offers educational, therapeutic and pro-social opportunities for juvenile offenders and their families.

The Justice Courts continue to expand and enhance their specialty Court programs in each of the three main cities. The Bullhead City Municipal Court, under the direction of Judge Pete Psareas, recently received a 3-year, \$500,000 grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance to expand their Veterans Treatment court. Judge Dave Huerta and Judge John Taylor were recognized with the 2019 Judicial Officer Mental Health Criminal Justice Collaboration Award for their mental health wellness court.

Another important enhancement this year was the approval during the budget process to provide funding to hire a new judicial officer and supporting staff for the Superior court. I am grateful to the Board of Supervisors for their support of this new initiative. The new position allows the court to effectively address the continuing increase in case filings, particularly the increase in criminal cases. A fourth criminal division has now been established in the Superior Court helping us towards meeting established time standards.

On March 18, 2019 we were particularly excited to participate in a groundbreaking ceremony for the new Superior Courthouse in Kingman. This project has been in the works for more than 15 years and it is very gratifying to finally complete all plans and to have received final approval from the Board of Supervisors to move forward on the project. The new courthouse includes 4 floors of office space and courtrooms and will be approximately 66,000 square feet. This new facility will provide the courts with a state-of-the-art building which will improve access, increase security and provide a facility that will serve the community well for many years to come. It is anticipated that the building will be completed by the end of 2020.

Other awards received this year included the Juvenile Probation Department who received a Strategic Agenda award from the Supreme Court for their Opportunity School and Juvenile Health and Wellness Court. Kyle Rimel, Court IT Director was awarded the annual Presiding Judge award for his outstanding work and dedication. I was also very pleased to receive the Frank X. Gordon award from the Mohave County Bar Association following Judge Billy Sipe who received the award last year.

The goals of these new programs are to enhance services to the public and help individuals make significant changes in their lives. I invite you to take a few minutes to review the many efforts that are being done to improve court processes and procedures.

My thanks to the Arizona Supreme Court, the County Board of Supervisors and County Management for their continued support of the courts and our efforts to accomplish the mission of the Court. I am grateful for the remarkable work done by our devoted judicial officers and court staff.

NEWLY ELECTED SUPERIOR COURT JUDGE

The Mohave County Courts welcomed a newly elected Judicial Officer on January 1, 2019. The Honorable Eric E. Gordon was elected to fill the Division VI vacancy left by the retirement of Superior Court Judge Richard Weiss. Judge Gordon said

NEW SUPERIOR COURT COMMISSIONER

We welcomed another newly appointed Judicial Officer in August 2019. The Honorable Megan A. McCoy was appointed to fill the newly created fourth full-time Court Commissioner position for the Superior Court. Judge McCoy said

**MENTAL WELLBEING COURT**

Kingman/Cerbat Justice Court Judges Huerta and Taylor, with the assistance of the Mohave County Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office and Legal Defender's Office, have developed and been conducting a Mental Well being Court. The goal of this specialty court is to give defendants with mental health issues who have committed misdemeanor offenses the opportunity to avoid a criminal conviction by participating and complying with the court. The process typically begins with the court identifying a defendant at the Initial Appearance Hearing whether while in custody or being summoned. The defendant could also be identified by their attorney who would recommend them for the specialty court based on being determined Seriously Mental Ill (SMI). Defense counsel, along with the prosecutor, enter into an agreement where the defendant is offered a plea agreement for a deferred entry of guilt, with a chance of earning a dismissal of their charges. The defendant is required to participate and comply with the directions of their mental health facility and appear at monthly special probation review hearings. The hearings are conducted at the court with the participation of the judge, prosecutor, defense and the mental health counselors. At the hearings the court visits with the defendant and confirms that they are compliant, which is collaborated by the counselor. After the defendant has completed their requirements, the court presents them with a graduation certificate and a dismissal of their charges. The Court has seen a very high success rate resulting in a low recidivism rate.


**QUALITY OF LIFE COURT**

Kingman/Cerbat Justice Court Judges Huerta and Taylor, with the assistance of the Mohave County Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office, Legal Defender's Office, Kingman Police Department and Mohave County Probation Office have developed and been conducting a "Quality of Life Court" for first time heroin offenders. The participant is assigned to the specialty court via a plea agreement and must comply with the requirements of the court. The participant must participate in court hearings, assigned counseling, community work service, drug testing and eventually become employed. The participant must succeed and advance in four different stages of the court and file petitions to advance to each stage. Team members consisting of the Judge, Probation Officer and drug counselors must agree the participant earns the right to advance by their compliance and behavior. If and when the participant achieves all the requirements they earn a dismissal of their drug charges and participate in a graduation ceremony. The Court held one graduation in May and have other participants that are close to achieving graduation. The members of the Quality of Life Court believe it is important to try our best to change negative behavior at the early stages by promoting sobriety and stability to these individuals that enter into the court system.



**NEW SOURCE OF PAY TO OUR JURORS**

The Clerk's Office switched from paying jurors by checks through the mail to giving jurors a debit card upon check-in to receive their pay for service and mileage. This has cut down on postage costs and has simplified payroll at the end of the week. In addition, communication with jurors about their pay has been easier thanks to the debit card company's staff that assists them through a customer service line.



**LAW LIBRARY**

The Mohave County Law Library Resource Center served a total of 8,538 patrons during Fiscal Year 2019. This number includes members of the public and legal community and is the culmination off daily requests for information; whether in person, e-mail, telephone or chat lines (local and state).



**E-CERTIFICATION**

Thanks to our great IT staff, the Clerk of the Superior Court now has the ability to e-certify documents for other agencies. This will save the research clerk and front counter clerks a significant amount of time. A portion of the Attorney General's (AG's) Office and Mohave County Attorney's Office (CAO) have signed an agreement for this service, and more agencies are expected to follow.



**ONLINE HIGH CONFLICT PARENT CLASS**

The Mediation Department has been working with an online program to develop a High Conflict program as an option for individuals who live outside the area. Onlineparentingprograms.com created a custom 4 hour program specifically for the court that provides instruction and training to match the current classroom program being offered by the department.

## TIME STANDARDS REPORTING

Caseflow management continues to be an essential part of operating the Mohave County Courts efficiently. Part of this process includes the detailed reporting of all case types. The Courts in Mohave County have always focused on differentiated case management of cases, and this past year the 7<sup>th</sup> Final Phase of state standard reporting requirements were reported.




## ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 2019-04

Administrative Order 2019-04 went into effect January 2019. This Order incorporated numerous changes to daily operations, one of which was giving parties in Civil cases only 90 days to effect service, otherwise the case is dismissed. Also, the Judicial Officers were required to draft a “Case Management Plan” providing a framework as to how cases were going to be handled.




## COURT ADMINISTRATION NOTICES

During the course of Fiscal Year 2019 over 148 Notices were sent by mail or via electronic means to the parties of Civil, Family Law, and Probate case types. These Notices prompted action from the parties or Court dismissal due to inactivity as per the applicable Arizona Court Rules. In addition, Court Administration identified 27 Civil Cases that breached the “time to serve” limits of Administrative Order 2019-04.










## CRIMINAL (CR) CASE FILINGS



### FOURTH CRIMINAL DIVISION

In July, 2019 a fourth Criminal Division was created. The Honorable Doug Camacho was re-assigned to this position and the active caseload was distributed accordingly. Case filings are expected to continue to increase as a result of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Grand Jury. The addition of a fourth Criminal Bench creates openings in court calendars and opportunities for meaningful events to quickly resolve cases.



# Facilities & Technology Infrastructure



## REMOTE PRESENTATION

Being a connected community, we are now seeing a wide range of electronic devices come into our courtrooms that contain digital evidence. Some of these devices do not have the ability to physically connect into our courtroom evidence systems. Therefore, we have installed wireless systems in each courtroom that will allow individuals to connect into these systems wirelessly from any source capable of wireless communication.



## PUBLIC WEB SITE

As with any technology, functionality and usability must continue to be evaluated to ensure target goals are met. Although our public web site was meeting the needs of our customer base, we implemented a new version that streamlined several processes and allowed the users increased visibility of highly accessed areas as well as introduced a new menu system that allowed seamless click free navigation to most pages. In addition, the new site offers a high level of usability from smart phones and tablets emphasizing low bandwidth access for mobile devices. The changes thus far have proved very beneficial to our user community as we have received a great deal of positive feedback.



## LAW AND JUSTICE CENTER

The construction of the Mohave County Law and Justice Center in Kingman has introduced an opportunity for the Mohave County Court Technology Services Department to internalize the purchasing, configuration and installation of all Audio / Video electronics throughout the entire complex. By taking this approach and moving all advanced Audio / Video system implementations in house it will not only eliminate the cost of outsourcing these services but will also prepare the onsite staff to maintain these systems in house. This will eliminate the need for the annual maintenance cost of over \$6,000 per year, per courtroom. During the 2019 Fiscal Year, Court Technology has invested a great deal of time training and preparing for this installation and has already installed this type of system in five courtrooms in Kingman, Bullhead and Lake Havasu.



## EXPANDED TEXT NOTIFICATION

Mohave County Courts were early adopters of sending out text notifications to court users reminding them of court payments due and Jury Duty. This past year, Court Technology expanded on this process to include sending out text notices reminding users of hearings in Superior Court. For example, updates on High Profile Cases or emergency notifications were provided. This process has been very successful and will continue to expand in future years.



### NETWORK SECURITY

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Network and user security are absolutely essential and ongoing efforts to enhance security continues to be a major focus for the court. Mohave County Court Technology

Department has invested a great deal of time and resources conducting penetration testing, user testing and recovery from such disasters. Teaming with the State of Arizona and other agencies around the State has proven to be very beneficial in securing our data and infrastructure.



### VIDEO ANYWHERE

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In today's mobile world we must continue to advance our methods and practices to assist the users of the Court to work within our system as efficiently and effectivity as possible. With this in mind, we have expanded our internal courtroom video conferencing systems to directly integrate with external video systems. This allows participants to join into court proceedings from virtually anywhere or use any device that has a camera and is connected to the internet.



### ENTRANCE DISPLAY MONITORS

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When the public enters any public facility, it can be confusing and overwhelming, especially in a Courthouse environment. The Mohave County Court Technology Department has recognized this challenge and have minimized this confusion by enhancing our front entrance displays to list the daily hearings, times and locations of all court calendars, along with general court information. These systems have been in place for a few years now; however, recently they have been upgraded to be more user friendly and include expanded information.



### SERVER REFRESH

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This past year several major network servers and video systems were replaced with newer and smarter technology. This type of refresh program allows the Courts in Mohave County to stay current with advanced technology that provides greater reliability to the services we offer.



### KIOSK UPGRADE

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The sheer geographic size of Mohave County offers up many challenges to our citizens, especially those located in the remote areas of our County. The Court Technology Department has helped remove some of these challenges by installing a Kiosk in one of our most remote regions of the County near the Grand Canyon. Residents in this remote area can now travel to this Kiosk and interact either by video or chat service directly with the courts in the area. This system was installed several years ago; however, during this FY we completed a full system upgrade to allow this service to continue.



# Professional and Engaged Workforce



## EXPANSION OF AIM AND JHAWC

The Juvenile Division of Mohave County Probation Department continues to expand successful programs to other areas of the county. Project AIM, an evening reporting program, began in Kingman in 2018 to provide a central location for delinquent youth to receive educational opportunities, pro-social growth, and family engagement with the collaboration of community providers. Project AIM recently began operating one night a week in Lake Havasu City.

The Juvenile Health and Wellness Court (JHAWC), a mental health specialty court, began in Bullhead City in 2019. The goal of JHAWC is to assist juveniles in finding and attending community-based services to stabilize and maintain sound mental health so as to reinforce acceptable behaviors to achieve improved outcomes. JHAWC expanded to Kingman in April 2019 and expects to begin operating in Lake Havasu City.



## MARICOPA COUNTY ADULT PROBATION LEADERSHIP ACADEMY GRADUATE



On December 6, 2018 Deputy Probation Officer Senior Julie Somma graduated from the Maricopa Probation Department's Senior Leadership Academy. The class consisted of probation supervisors throughout the state, enabling her to further grow a network of peers to learn from. Her graduation quote was that "leadership is a continuous journey. As a leader I need to create stability for my team and that we all win and lose together." Julie currently serves as the supervisor for Kingman's Adult Probation field unit.



## MOHAVE COUNTY JUVENILE COURT COMMUNITY ADVISORY BOARD



The Juvenile Division of the Mohave County Probation Department continues to encourage community outreach and collaboration through its Community Advisory Boards (CAB). The Community Advisory Boards continue to be active in Bullhead City, Lake Havasu City, and Kingman through their support of programs and activities that provide pro-social and educational opportunities for youth and families. The Community Advisory Boards donated funds to support Bullhead City Firebirds Football and Cheer, Caring Hearts for Horses, Kingman Police Department Explorers, Kingman Area Literacy Project, Arevalo Martial Arts, and the Lake Havasu City Baton Twirlers.


### JUVENILE DETENTION CENTER GARDEN PROJECT

A group of Probation and Detention staff came together to make a vision a reality. In a detained setting where juveniles are often left feeling alone and vulnerable, this group saw the opportunity to engage them, teach them, and provide a therapeutic outlet for them at the same time. Utilizing their personal and professional strengths, they organized a plan to start a garden in detention. This project will allow youth to be engaged from the beginning by constructing moveable planters from scratch, to planting seedlings and sprouts, all the way to harvesting their plants and using them in culinary class to feed detained youth, staff, and visitors. The youth will take cultivate their gardening skills in the classroom and learn the science behind plant growth and horticulture.



### ANNUAL COJET CONFERENCE

The Court's annual COJET conference was held in January at the Mohave Community College campus in Kingman. Staff was provided with over 20 different classes to choose from and a wonderful closing plenary session presented by Janet Cornell. The two and a half day conference was attended by 230 court and probation employees who were able to acquire 1771 total class hours of training. Staff were appreciative of the good instruction provided by local employees as well as staff from the Administrative Office of the Courts. This annual program helps ensure the employees continue to stay current with new changes in court procedure and on current practices in the court. Special thanks to all those who serve on the COJET committee and made this a great success.



### 2019-2023 STRATEGIC PLAN

With the aim of building upon an agreement among the Strategic Planning Team Members concerning the destiny of Mohave County Courts, the Strategic Plan was updated into the year 2023. The Strategic Pillars used the last 5 years were redesignated and are noted in this years Annual Report. In addition to the revisited Goals and Objectives within the Strategic Plan, the “Vision of the Future” statement was refreshed. Five “Implementation Teams” were created to execute the Goals and Objectives identified within.



# Community Engagement & Partnerships



## 8TH ANNUAL NORTHWEST ARIZONA SYMPOSIUM ON INFANT AND TODDLER MENTAL HEALTH

The Mohave County Superior Court Team hosted their 8th Annual Northwest Arizona Symposium on Infant and Toddler Mental Health on April 10-11, 2019. The event was free to all attendees and was funded by Arizona's First Things First through an intergovernmental agreement with the Mohave County Superior Court. Over 400 professionals from Mohave and La Paz Counties and across Arizona gathered for two days of workshops, keynotes, and networking opportunities with one another.

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The Infant and Toddler Mental Health Symposium focuses on the importance of issues concerning children ages zero to three. The Symposium brings together multidisciplinary evidenced-based practices to aid in the prevention, recognition, assessment and treatment of traumatic experiences in young children and their families. The goal of the Symposium is to provide an opportunity to enhance professional, investigative and legal skills when dealing with all forms of maltreatment including those related to family violence.



## COURT OF APPEALS ORAL ARGUMENTS

On February 7, 2019 the Arizona Court of Appeals, Division One, held oral arguments at Lee Williams High School in Kingman. Court briefs were provided to students prior to the event to help them prepare to understand the Court process. Following the oral arguments, students were given the chance to ask questions and learn more about the judicial process. All Mohave County High Schools were invited to attend this event. In attendance were 200+ students and members of the public.



## 2019 JUDICIAL OFFICER MENTAL HEALTH CRIMINAL JUSTICE COLLABORATION AWARD

David's Hope was honored to present the 2019 Judicial Officer Mental Health Criminal Justice Collaboration Award to Judge David Huerta and Judge John Taylor. For their tireless efforts that exemplified their desires to refuse to accept the status quo and pursue new and better ways to improve outcomes and pursue recovery for people living with mental disorders and addictions. Their work in the Kingman/Cerbat Court brought understanding to many, that justice and safety often can be better served when those identified with a mental illness can be removed from the jail to receive healthcare services in the community. ## 4TH ANNUAL SUPERHERO 5K AND KIDS DASH

The 4th Annual Superhero 5K and Kids Dash was held in April, which is recognized as Child Abuse Prevention Month. Children and families attended this community event dressed in their favorite superhero costumes. The Kids Dash kicked off the morning of the event with kids ages one through twelve running to the finish line to earn their Superhero Medal. Following the Kids Dash was the 5k race where more than sixty runners and walkers alike crossed the finish line. The proceeds from this event benefitted the CASA Council of Mohave County. The Council is the fundraising arm of the CASA Organization which advocates in court for our children in foster care. Our children have many needs which the State can no longer afford such as Boys and Girls Club, Parks and Rec programs, summer camps, equine therapy, athletic fees, electronic devices for developmentally delayed children, etc. These are just some of the many requests the Council helps fulfill for the kids. 



Superior Court


Superior Court Administrative Case Type




Superior Court Civil Case Type




Superior Court Criminal Case Type



Superior Court Family Law Case Type




Superior Court Juvenile Case Type




Justice Court Criminal Traffic Case Type

  - FY 2019 was spent planning on the establishment of a collaborative effort between Southwest Behavioral (SWBH) and Adult Probation for collocating the agencies to provide services. On Friday, August 9, 2019, the collaboration of SWBH clinicians at probation began and will continue every Friday afternoon from 12 pm to 5 pm . SWBH will be conducting screenings, intakes, and referrals for services at the probation department.
