

Runaway Handbook



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Suggestions for Parents to Consider

- 1. Pay attention when your children are talking with you, listen.
 - a. Do not just nod your head while you are watching television or reading the paper, or using your computer.
 - b. Don't just pretend to listen to them
 - c. Kids know the difference
- 2. Give Respect Acknowledge and support your children's struggle to grow to maturity.
- 3. Understand Try to sympathize with what your kids are going through.
 - a. Look at life at least occasionally from their point of view.
 - b. Remember when you were their age; your ideas seemed to make sense to you.
- 4. Do not lecture All children hate to be lectured to, especially teenagers.
 - a. However, all kids respond to clear information and direction, most of all when they know that the questions they ask will be answered.
- 5. Do not Label The throwing around of useless labels will only confuse the real issues that you wish to address.
- 6. Discuss Feelings Talk about what you, as a parent, feel and what you need.
 - a. Allow your child to talk about his or her feelings too.
- 7. Create Responsibility Give your children choices, not orders.
 - a. Help them to understand the consequences of their actions.
- 8. Positive Praise Describe your child's positive and negative behavior, and how it affects others.
 - a. Be specific, and give praise to reward good behavior.
 - i. Do this as least as often, if not more so, than you criticize behavior which you do not like.
- 9. Stop Hassling Asking your child too many questions often shuts off information.
 - a. Give them the opportunity to volunteer their thoughts and feelings, while you show a sincere interest, without probing.
- 10. Do not Always Give the Answers You want your children to be able to find their own answers or solutions to problems.
 - a. You can help this by not giving them the answers all the time.
- 11. Use Team Work Work together with your child to lay out the problems and find a mutually agreeable solution.
- The Key Issue You MUST tell each of your children that you will always love the child, NO MATTER WHAT.

- 1. Set aside time to talk.
- 2. Do not expect your family to read your mind.
- 3. Be specific and realistic about your expectations and requests.
- 4. Have patience! Good communication takes time and effort
- 5. Brainstorm ideas before making a final decision.
- 6. Ask for input from family members.
- Write things down; make a list of changes you want to see.
- 8. Be willing to compromise.
- 9. Do fun things together.
- 10. Use community resources when you need help.



Three Universal Truths and Four Aces

Imagine examining, over seven years, the best research from the fields of psychology, education, sociology, recreation, criminology, social work, and medicine then synthesizing all the knowledge into three Universal Truths, which, if adopted, could support the success of all children without exception.

These overall findings lead to **Kids at Hope**, an evidenced based, strategic-cultural model, which reverses the "youth at risk" paradigm by establishing a culture that engages an entire school, youth organization, and/or community.

- Children succeed when they are surrounded by adults who believe they can succeed no exceptions.
- Children succeed when they have meaningful and sustainable relationships with caring adults.
- Children succeed when they can articulate their future in four domains: Home and Family; education and Career; Community and service; and Hobbies and Recreation.

Four Aces

Every adult holds these four aces. Your ace of heart belongs to your own children. Give it to them each day that you are privileged to have them in your home. However, your ace of clubs, spades and diamonds can be given to every child you know and meet if only you will take the time to deal them out. You will discover that your aces are magical, for the more times you give them away, the more times they will reappear in your hand to re-deal again the next day to another child who just needs to know that the world cares.

Kids at Hope hopes that you will come recognize powerful aces you hold in your hand and that you will give them to the children in your world with love a belief in their tomorrow.



Ace of Hearts - Anchor/Parent: Responsible for child's physical and emotional wellbeing 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year in an unconditional loving way.

Ace of Clubs - Other Caring Adult: The more the merrier successful people surround themselves with significant, positive adults- many clusters of adults can be the other positive person in a child's life. All adults, regardless of job, status, income, or position have this ace. Give this ace to lots of children. Let them know they live in a society that values them.

Ace of Spades - High Expectations: Always pointing upwards - sky is the limit! Raise the high bar for all children, not just those who are advantaged by economics, athletic ability, or scholastic achievement. Successful people state that had someone in their life who believed in them at times more than they believed in

themselves. These adults are known as "Treasure Hunters." Give this ace to as many children as you can. Let them know you expect them to do well.


Ace of Diamonds - Opportunities to Succeed: Success breeds success - the

more successful experiences a child has, the greater the chances of forming a pattern of success. As if the four sides of a diamond, there are four ways to help a child feel successful - belonging to something positive, feeling useful, feeling competent, feeling empowered. Let children know that winning may not happen every day, but success can happen if children are given this ace.

Deliverables:

- Children become much more optimistic
- Children not only understand the concept of hope, they can model it
- Children learn and practice the power and self-fulfilling prophecy (*belief system*) of positive self talk (*Kids at Hope Pledge*)
- · Children learn about personal strength based inventory and practice it
- · Children's academic and emotional achievement matures
- Adults learn and practice the power of the self-fulfilling prophecy to support a child's achievement
- Adults learn and practice how to measure a child's potential, not just their behavior *(Kids at Hope Report Card)*
- Adults learn and practice how to instill hope in every child without exception (*Passport to the Future*)
- Adults learn and practice the types of meaningful and sustainable relationships needed by children Aces

PROGRAMS, SERVICES, RESOURCES

Between 1.6 and 2.8 million youth run away in a year 1 2, while countless others contemplate leaving their home. Reasons range from issues at home and problems with peers, to abuse and challenges at school. Regardless of why they run, the National Runaway Safeline (NRS) is here to help. As the go-to resource for runaway, homeless, throwaway and at-risk youth and their families, NRS, through its free and confidential 1-800-RUNAWAY hotline and 1800RUNAWAY.org online services, provides support and access to resources 24 hours a day.

CRISIS INTERVENTION:

NRS operates a confidential crisis

1-800-RUNAWAY hotline and 1800RUNAWAY.org online services 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Our texting option and online services; live chat, crisis emails, bulletin board, provide more ways for teens in crisis to connect to help. Our frontline team of staff and volunteers receive 40+ hours of training to provide non-judgmental, non-sectarian, and non-directive support, empowering callers to develop a plan of action to improve their situation.

INFORMATION AND REFERRALS:

A nation-wide database of nearly 10,000 youth and family resources provides countless Options for callers to access a myriad of services, such as counseling, shelter services, alcohol/drug treatment and child protective services.

CONFERENCE CALLS:

When youth request assistance contacting their family or an agency that can help, NRS facilitates a conference call. The frontline team member remains on the line with the youth, advocating, as needed, on their behalf.

HOME FREE:

In partnership with Greyhound Lines, Inc., NRS helps reunite runaway youth with their families or extended families through a free bus ticket home. Over 15,000 youth have been reunited with families through the Home Free Program since 1995.
